DEFINITIONS

- Although they are indicative and open to discussion, in order to avoid misinterpretations the following definitions will be used:
- conservation: its aim is to safeguard the quality and values of a building or of a built environment, to protect its material substance and to ensure its integrity for future generations;
- consolidation: its aim is to physically add or use adhesive of supportive materials to the actual fabric in order to ensure its continued durability, or structural integrity;

- maintenance: its aim is to keep a building or a built environment in its existing state of repair: it is, therefore, one of the aims of protection (see);
- protection: its aims are to prevent the deterioration of a building or of a built environment, to keep it in its existing state of repair and to ensure its continued durability and structural integrity;
- regeneration: its aim is to adapt a building or a built environment to a contemporary use which will be capable of sustaining it (also called reconditioning, renovation, remodelling, revitalisation, adaptation);

- rehabilitation: its aim is to physically improve an empty or inappropriately structure in order to provide an appropriate use;
- renewal: its aim is to reconstruct a building or a built environment, either or both to improve urban living conditions or to use the site for new buildings which bring a higher return on capital (also called restructuring, redevelopment, replacement);
- restoration: its aim is to revive the original concept of a building or of a built environment in relation to its fabric and/or use.
