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Introduction to the Training Manual

Objectives of the Training

Introduction

In order to properly use a computer or computing device it is necessary to have a basic understanding of what a basic computer is and how it operates. All computers have two things in common, *hardware* and *software*.

- → Hardware is what the computer is physically made up of; which includes the monitor, keyboard and mouse, and all of its internal components which allows it to store, receive, and process information and data.
 - The **central processing unit (CPU)**, or processor, contains logic circuitry and performs the instructions of a computer's programs. It is the "brain" of the computer.
 - **Read-only memory (ROM)** is the memory that comes with your computer that is pre-written to hold the instructions for booting-up the computer. Information can be read from ROM, but not written back to it. ROM will retain data when the computer is powered off. It is known as non-volatile memory.
 - **Random access memory (RAM)** is the memory available for the operating system, programs and processes to use when the computer is running. RAM can be read from, and written to, for processing information and instructions. Data in RAM is not permanently written and therefore known as volatile memory. When you power off your computer the data stored in RAM is deleted.
- → Software is made up of informational data and code that acts as a set of instructions informing the hardware what actions it is to perform or initiate. (ie. Software applications: The computer's operating system, *Microsoft Word* (word processing), *Excel* (spreadsheets and data calculation), Web browsers: *Internet Explorer, Mozilla Firefox, Google Chrome,* and *Apple Safari*, Search engines: *Google, Bing, Yahoo*)

There are several different kinds of computers. The most common computers are desktop computers, laptop computers, tablet or touchscreen computers, and servers which allow computers to network and connect with each other via the local area networks (LAN) or the Internet. Other examples of computers may also include smart phones, gaming counsels, kiosks and computers that may also be found in home appliances such as TVs, refrigerators, and vehicles which make use of software applications or apps to connect and communicate with Internet service.

A computer is more than just another household appliance. The vast amount of information and possibilities can be overwhelming.

keyboard and mouse

You interact with a computer mainly by using the **keyboard** and **mouse**, or a **trackpad** on laptops. Most people find it comfortable to place the keyboard on the desk directly in front of them and the mouse to one side of the keyboard.



The mouse controls the **pointer** on the screen. Whenever you move the mouse across the desk, the pointer will move in a similar manner. A mouse usually has three buttons (left, right and middle button). You will often interact with the computer by moving the mouse pointer over something on the computer screen, then clicking one of the buttons.



On laptops, you can use the **trackpad**, located below the keyboard, instead of a mouse. Simply drag your finger across the trackpad to move the **pointer** on the screen. Some trackpads do not have buttons, so you'll either press or tap the trackpad to click.



The keyboard allows you to type letters, numbers, and words into the computer. Whenever you see a flashing vertical line—called the **cursor**—you can start typing.



Turning on a computer

The very first step is to turn on the computer. Make sure all the cables are plugged in correctly, and locate the power button. It's in a different place on every computer, but it will have the universal power button symbol (shown below).

Once turned on, your computer takes time before it's ready to use. You may see a few different displays flash on the screen. This process is called **booting up**, and it can take anywhere from 15 seconds to several minutes. Once the computer has **booted up**, it may be ready to use, or it may require you to **log in**. This means identifying yourself by typing your user name or selecting your profile, then typing your password. If you've never logged in to your computer before, you may need to create an account.



The main screen you'll start from is the **desktop**. From here, you can access the programs and features you need to use your computer. **Icons** are used to represent different files, applications, and commands on your computer. An icon is a small image that's intended to give you an idea at a glance of what it represents, like a logo. Double-clicking an icon on the desktop will open that application or file.

Using a computer



A **button** is a command that performs a specific function within an application. The most commonly used commands in a program will be represented by buttons.



Menus are organized collections of commands and shortcuts. Click a **menu** to open it and display the commands and shortcuts within. Then click an item in the **menu** to execute it.




When you open an application or folder, it is displayed in its own **window**. A **window** is a contained area—like a picture within a picture—with its own menus and buttons specific to that program.

You can rearrange multiple **windows** on the desktop and switch between them.




The file system icon will be in the bottom-left part of the screen. On a PC, the **File Explorer icon** looks like a folder, as in the image below.




When you **double-click** a file, your computer will automatically use the correct application to open it. In our example, we're opening a Microsoft Word document (**Chicago Trip Details**), which will open in **Microsoft Word**.

Opening file and application systems




However, there may be times you may want to open an application directly, instead of just opening a file.

• To open an application, click the **Start** button, then select the desired application. If you don't see the one you want, you can click **All Programs** to see a full list, or simply **type the name of the application** on your keyboard to search for it. In the example below, we're opening **Internet Explorer**.




Basic navigation

If you see the file you want, you can double-click it with your mouse. Otherwise, you can use the **Navigation pane** on the left side of the window to select a different location.



Deleting files

Windows use **Recycle Bin**—to prevent you from accidentally deleting files. When you delete a file, it is moved to the Trash can. If you change your mind, you can move the file back to its original location.




If you want to permanently delete the file, you will need to **empty the Recycle Bin**. To do this, right-click the icon and select **Empty Recycle Bin**.



Adjusting computer's settings When you start using a new computer, you may want to begin by adjusting the computer's settings. Adjusting your settings can range from simple tasks such as changing your **desktop background** to more advanced tasks like adjusting your **security** or **keyboard settings**.

• In Windows 10, click the Start button, then select Settings.



• In Windows 8.1 and earlier, click the Start button, then locate and select the Control Panel.



Shutting down computer

When you have done everything that you want using your computer, it's important to **shut it down properly**.

• To shut down **Windows**, click the **Start** button, then select **Shut down** (in some versions, this may say **Turn Off Computer** or look like the power symbol).

1. The Ribbon

The ribbon menu is found across many of Microsoft's apps, such as Word, Excel, and PowerPoint. It lives above the main area of the application.

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The PowerPoint ribbon lets you switch between various tabs. It contains a series of tabs that you can switch between. Each of these have a unique set of tools to work with your presentation differently. When you switch tabs on the ribbon, you'll see new buttons and options to modify your presentation:

- File Save, share, and export your presentation.
- **Home** A general purpose collection of the most common tools that you'll use in PowerPoint.
- **Insert** An all-in-one tool to add every imagine-able type of content, such as tables, pictures, charts, video, and more.
- **Design** Controls the overall look and feel of your presentation with theme and style settings.
- **Transitions** Add animations when you switch slides.
- Animations Controls the order and style that objects will enter or exit your slide with.
- **Slide Show** Control settings related to the way your presentation appears when sharing it with an audience.

2. Home Tab

Use it for: a general selection of the most popular tools in *PowerPoint*.

I usually stay on the **Home** tab when I'm working in PowerPoint. The **Home** tab is the default and has many of the most commonly used tools, all in one bar from adding a new slide to changing text and paragraph settings.

3. Insert Tab

When you're working on adding content to a slide, the **Insert** tab has every possible tool to add new content to a slide. The **Insert** tab has the tools you need to add tables, pictures, charts, and more.



4. Views

PowerPoint has a variety of views which are simply different ways to work with the same presentation. You can change the view in order to get a different perspective on your content.




In the screenshot below, you can see the difference between the default **Normal** view and **Slide Sorter** view. **Normal** view shows each slide front and center, while **Slide Sorter** view creates thumbnails that you can drag and drop to reorder the presentation.




5. Design Tab

An attractive presentation can really grab your audience's attention. We use themes and styles in PowerPoint to add visual appeal to the presentation, and the Design tab really controls these settings.



Quick Access Toolbar


Like the tabs and ribbon with other Microsoft Office products, you also have the Quick Access Toolbar. As the name implies, this feature allows you to perform quick actions.



- The **Save** button lets you easily save the file you are working on with the current file name.
- If you make a mistake and want to undo it, just click the Undo button. If you click it once, it will undo the last action you took. If you keep clicking it, it will undo each previous action by moving backward. Alternatively, you can click the arrow next to the Undo button and highlight all actions you want to undo.
- If you undo an action with the button, the **Redo** button will then be clickable. This lets you redo what you have just undone. Like the **Undo** button, you can redo your last action with one click or use the arrow next to the **Redo** button to redo multiple actions.
- The **Presentation** button lets you start your slideshow as it will be viewed by others. It should take up your entire screen for a nice view of the presentation at any time during your creating or editing processes.

You can select the **arrow** on the right of the Quick Access Toolbar to add or remove buttons from it easily. You can also see more commands available or move the toolbar below the ribbon.

To insert a new slide, go to the **Insert** tab on PowerPoint's ribbon. Then, click on the **New Slide** button to add a new slide to your presentation.




A new slide will have basic placeholders to add your content to in PowerPoint.

Adding Slides

Adding Content

Content is what defines each and every slide. PowerPoint accommodates a wide range of content like text, graphs, tables, charts, and more. The easiest way to add content is to start off by choosing a **Layout**, which you can choose from the **Home** tab.



These layouts have content boxes that are easy to add your own content to. Simply choose a layout, and then start adding your content.

After you build out your presentation's content, it's a great idea to think about adding visual style. For this, you'll jump over to the **Design** tab, and click on one of the thumbnails for a theme.




Using Notes in Your Presentations

When you present your slideshow to an audience, only you can see your notes. This makes it a great tool to hold your descriptions, explanations, or instructions as you present your slideshow.



If you are considering adding animations to your slides, it's super easy to do. Animations can be effective for slideshows you create for education like classroom presentations or college lectures. These are the basic features available on the **Animations** tab.

- Animation: Choose from a variety of options by clicking the arrow in the Animation
- **Effect Options**: Different animations have extra options for you to pick from.
- Advanced Animation: Here you can add an animation, open the Animation Pane for more working room, set up a trigger, or use the Animation Painter.
- **Timing**: Decide how you want your animations to appear on the slide. You can pick a duration time, delay time, and reorder your animations.
- **Preview**: Once you add an animation you can see a quick view of how it will look without exiting the editing mode or opening the presentation view.


Apply Transition Effects

Inserting transitions between your slides can be another effective way to keep your audience's attention, similar to animations. You can apply a unique visual, with or without sound, as you move through the slides of your presentation.

Transition Options

These are the basic features available on the Transitions tab.

- **Transition to This Slide**: Pick from the transition options by clicking the arrow in the box.
- **Effect Options**: Different transitions have extra options that you can apply. For example, the Wipe, Wind, and Orbit transitions let you pick the direction.
- **Timing**: Here you can add a sound to go with your transition, pick a duration time, and apply these items to all slides.
- **Preview**: Once you add a transition you can see a quick view of how it will look without exiting the editing mode or opening the presentation view.



Use Different Presentation Views Not everyone works the same way when it comes being creative. Luckily PowerPoint offers different built-in views to accommodate this. Just select the **View** tab and take a look at the ways in which you can work with your slideshow.

The **Presentation Views** section holds five unique ways to create or edit your slideshow. One of those is the **Notes Page** which you read about above. And, here are the other four with brief explanations.

- 1. **Normal**: As you can probably guess, this is the basic, normal view. You should see your slides on the left as numbered thumbnails and the current slide in the largest section to the right. This view works well if you prefer to jump between slides visually.
- 2. **Outline View**: For those who prefer to write or create using outlines, this view is ideal. You can write directly within the outline pane on the left or paste an existing outline from

Microsoft Word directly in. Here again, the current slide is in the largest section to the right. 3. Slide Sorter: This is a terrific way to see all of your slides at a glance. Taking up the entire center window, you can see each slide and can reorder them easily with a drag-and-drop action. 4. **Reading View**: If you want to see your entire presentation without switching to full-screen mode, then just click this button. You can view your slideshow with animations and transitions easily. 



Tip: When you finish recording your narration, a sound icon appears in the lower-right corner of each slide that has narration.

The recorded slide show timings are automatically saved. Timings are shown in **Slide Sorter** view just beneath each slide.



In this process, what you record is embedded in each slide, and the recording can be played back in Slide Show. A video file is not created by this recording process. However, if you want a video



Set the slide timings manually

PowerPoint automatically records your slide timings when you add narrations, or you can manually set the slide timings to accompany your narrations.

- ✓ In **Normal** view, click the slide that you want to set the timing for.
- ✓ On the Transitions tab, in the Timing group, under Advance Slide, select the After check box, and then enter the number of seconds indicating how long the slide should appear on the screen. Repeat the process for each slide that you want to set the timing for.

Tip: If you want the next slide to appear *either* when you click the mouse or automatically after the number of seconds that you enter—whichever comes first—select both the **On Mouse**

Click and the After check boxes.

Delete timings or narration

The **Clear** command is for deleting timings or narration from your recording that you don't want or that you want to replace. There are four different **Clear** commands that allow you to:

- ✓ Delete the *timings* on the *currently selected slide*
- \checkmark Delete the *timings* on *all slides* at once

	✓ Delete the <i>narration</i> on the <i>currently selected slide</i>
	✓ Delete the <i>narration</i> on <i>all slides</i> at once

Built-in cameras and microphones are suitable for most tasks. But if you want more professional-looking video, consider using an external web cam, if you're able. If you're using PowerPoint on a tablet or laptop and you're inking with a stylus, an external camera and microphone allows you to minimize stylus noise.

As soon as you finish your first slide recording, play it back. Before you get too far down the road of recording your presentation, make sure your audio and video sound and look the way you expect.

Consider the following tips to maintain a clear message and to keep your audience attentive and interested.

- → Minimize the number of slides keep the number of slides in your presentation to a minimum.
- → Choose an audience-friendly font size font size smaller than 30 might be too difficult for the audience to see from distance.
- → Keep your slide text simple use bullets or short sentences, and try to keep each item to one line. Some projectors crop slides at the edges, so that long sentences might be cropped.



A mobile device (or handheld computer) is a computing device small enough to hold and operate in the hand. Typically, any handheld computer device have an LCD or OLED flat screen interface, providing a touchscreen interface with digital buttons and keyboard or physical buttons along with a physical keyboard. New data storage, processing and display technologies have allowed these small devices to do nearly anything that had previously been traditionally done with larger personal computers. Many such devices can connect to the Internet and interconnect with other devices such as car entertainment systems or headsets via Wi-Fi. Bluetooth. cellular networks or near field communication (NFC). Integrated cameras, digital media players, the ability to place and receive telephone calls, video games, and Global Positioning System (GPS) capabilities are common.

Characteristics of Mobile Devices

Mobile Devices and Their Uses Mobile devices have similar characteristics. Among them are: -

- ✓ Wi-Fi or cellular access to the internet
- \checkmark A battery that powers the device for several hours
- ✓ A physical or onscreen keyboard for entering information
- ✓ Size and weight that allows it to be carried in one hand and manipulated with the other hand
- ✓ Touch-screen interface in almost all cases
- ✓ A virtual assistant, like Siri, Cortana or Google Assistant
- ✓ The ability to download data from the internet, including apps and books
- ✓ Wireless operation

Times are changing now, and the focus has shifted mainly towards a mobile device populated world. Some of the most common mobile devices we use today include:

Smartphones – are handheld, can fit in a pocket, have a million and one uses, and help keep us connected at all times thanks to a constant network connection from a wireless carrier. There are many different device choices, so it should be easy to find a one that meets all of you needs.



Smartphones are advanced versions of traditional cell phones in that they have the same features as cell phones — such as the ability to make and receive phone calls, text messages and voicemail — but they can also be used to browse the internet, send and receive email, participate in social media and shop online. They also can download apps from the internet using a cellular or Wi-Fi connection to expand the smartphone capabilities in a vast number of ways.

Tablets – similarly to smartphones, tablets share many of the same benefits but in a larger form factor. Tablets are portable, like laptops, but they provide a different experience. Instead of running a traditional laptop and desktop computer applications, they run apps designed specifically for tablets. The experience is similar, but not the same as using a laptop computer. Tablets come in all sizes, from slightly larger than a smartphone to the size of a small laptop. Some examples include work presentations, heavy gaming, or even live streaming of shows in high definition on Netflix.



 Laptop Computers – devices have always been popular because they give us the functionality of a desktop computer that we can take anywhere. We can use the same operating system with the same programs, which means there is no device learning curve. Having a full-sized keyboard, the same input/output ports and the ability to connect an external display are some added benefits as well.



Smartwatches – devices are relatively new and play in somewhat of a niche market at this point in time. The main benefits a smartwatch can provide us the ability to get notifications and necessary information on our wrist without having to pick up another device. With some of the new standalone models, we can even take and receive phone calls just like our smartphones can.



 E-readers – its primary purpose is for reading. The Amazon Kindle and Barnes & Noble Nook have made the e-reader a popular choice for people who enjoy reading books in a digital format. These devices changed the whole concept of reading and helped to bring books into a new era.



 Handheld Gaming Consoles – or simply handheld console, is a small, portable self-contained video game console with a built-in screen, game controls, and speakers. Handheld game consoles are smaller than home video game consoles and contain the console, screen, speakers, and controls in one unit, allowing people to carry them and play them at any time or place.



Note: if the Wi-Fi service is available at your compound you should put the Wi-Fi icon (icon) in ON mode to get free internet connection. But if the Wi-Fi service is not available you need to make the mobile data in ON position to get internet connection with fee. In either case both the Wi-Fi and mobile data will help you to exchange date through internet.

4. While the "location" icon is in the ON position, go to the application menu and select/open the "Google maps" app (alternatively, you can go to the "Settings" and select the "Google" icons). When you open a Google maps app you will see a list of service available. For example, In the "Nearby" list you can find restaurants, coffee, bars, hotels and more. If you are in Arbaminch, for instance, the feature of "Nearby" (as the name indicates) will show/tell you the nearby places such as bars, hotels. Note that this is only possible if the places are recently registered in Google map. In Google map, however, you can find locations and places that you need by using/selecting features and/or typing the name of the locations in the search bar.

Now, to increase your familiarity with the Google map app, practice and explore its features repeatedly to see/get varieties of services.

Mobile Learning (*M-learning*) is education via the Internet or network using personal mobile devices, such as tablets and smartphones to obtain learning materials through mobile apps, social interactions and online educational hubs. What makes mobile learning different is that the content takes into account, the screen size of mobile phones and other mobile devices.

It is flexible, allowing students access to education anywhere, anytime. Students use mobile apps and tools to complete and upload assignments to teachers, download course instruction and work in online social groups to complete tasks. E.g., Duolingo is an app with which students can learn other languages by completing small daily tasks on their mobile phone.



Mobile Learning

Application Software

The word "app" is an abbreviation for "application." It's a piece of software program that is designed to run through a web browser or offline on your computer, and on a smartphone phone, tablet or other electronic devices, including smart TVs and smartwatches. Apps may or may not have a connection to the internet.

Types of Apps

There are three main types of apps: desktop, mobile, and web.

- Desktop apps are usually much fuller than mobile apps and consist of all the features of a program, whereas the
- mobile equivalent is a simpler and easier-to-use version.

Most desktop and web apps are built to be used with a mouse and keyboard along with a large display, but mobile apps are intended to be accessed with a finger or stylus on a small screen.

Mobile Apps

Mobile app allows us to do and accomplish various tasks. An application can be inbuilt or downloadable. Example of inbuilt applications are: window and android applications which are primarily designed to communicate with hardware devices. As the name indicates that Downloadable applications can easily accessible from the internet to be downloaded and installed in our device to do different activities. Examples of downloadable application are Internet Explores, Viber, telegram, Trucaller etc. in your mobile phone you can access varous apps from Play store and Gallaxy Apps. Now let us tryout.

Use your mobile phone and Go to the application menu. When you do so the screen like this will pop out. Here you may find two types of application store that are compatible/suitable apps for your mobile phone operating system: paly store and Galaxy apps.



Where to Get Mobile Apps

Almost every platform has a repository where its users can download both free and paid apps. These are normally accessible through the device itself or a website so that the app can be queued up for download the next time the user is on the device.

For example, the *Google Play store* and Amazon's Amazon Appstore are two places where Android users can download mobile apps. iPhones, iPod Touch devices, and iPads can get apps through the *App Store* straight from their devices.


Google Play is the app store that Google runs, and it's also an important piece of Android's security as it scans apps before and after they're downloaded and monitors them for unusual activity. It can be a bit overwhelming when you first open up Google Play, but don't worry, we're here to help you get started!

Searching for apps on Google Play


If you do not find an interesting application from the lists within the play store, you should search from the play store. If you already know the name of the app you're looking for, or have a specific app type in mind, you can search for it rather than browsing through app categories. In such a way, you can find out any application that is suitable to your phone from the play store.

Note: In order to get, download, and install applications from the store, you need to put your mobile data or Wi-Fi in ON position to get connected (i.e. internet connection is required).

- 1. Tap the **Google Play** icon on your home screen.
- 2. Tap the **white search bar** at the top of the screen.




- 3. Enter the **name** of the app (or type of app) you're looking for.
- 4. Tap the **search** icon on your keyboard (should be in the location of the Enter key).



You can browse through Google Play's Top Charts to try and find a new app you want to install.

- 1. Tap the **Google Play** icon on your home screen.
- 2. Tap Top Charts underneath the Home tab.



Swipe left and right between the charts for Top Free, Top Paid, Top Grossing, Top New Free, Top New Paid, and Trending. You can also browse through Google Play by category:


- 1. Tap the Google Play icon on your home screen.
- 2. Tap **Categories** underneath the Home/Games tabs.
- 3. Tap the **category** you'd like to browse.

Now, some app categories are just a series of Top Charts narrowed to that category of app, but other categories have featured apps and subcategories in addition to the Top Charts for that category.

- 1. Tap on an **app** in the search results or categories.
- 2. Tap **Read more** and look through the app's description and reviews to ensure the app seems right for you.
- 3. Tap **Install** button to allow the request.




As a result, the automatic downloading and installation process will begin. When the installation is completed you may see a message like "installation is completed or Successfully installed".



The app will now download and install itself, usually in a few seconds depending on how large or small the app is. If you're on a device running an older version of Android, you'll have to agree to an app's permissions before it downloads. Read the permissions before clicking **Agree**. Once the app is finished installing, an Open button will appear in the same place the Install button previously occupied.

Apps need updates from time to time, and if you need to manually update your apps, steps are:-

- 1. Swipe in from the **left edge** of the screen OR tap the **threeline menu icon** in the top white bar to open the menu.
- 2. Tap My apps & games.
- 3. App needing updates will appear at the top of the list. To update a single app, tap the **Update** box next to the app.
- 4. Tap Update All to update all the apps needing updates.




Toggle auto-update

Rather than manually updating apps, which is easy to forget, Google Play is set to automatically update apps for you when you're on Wi-Fi. If you'd prefer that it install updates automatically even when on cellular data — or not auto-update at all — you can change the setting easily.

- 1. Swipe in from the **left edge** of the screen OR tap the **threeline menu icon** in the top white bar to open the menu.
- 2. Scroll down and tap Settings.




- 3. Tap Auto-update apps.
- 4. To turn off auto-update, select **Do no auto-update apps**. To enable auto-update on cellular data, select **Auto-update at any time**.




If there are individual apps you do not want auto-updated, you can opt them out of auto-update while allowing your other apps to stay updated.

- 1. Tap the app you don't want auto-updating.
- 2. Tap **three-dot menu icon** in the top right corner of the screen (next to the search icon).
- 3. Tap to uncheck **Enable auto-update**.



- 1. Tap the app you want to uninstall.
- 2. Tap **Uninstall**. For some paid apps within the refund window, this box might read **Refund** instead.

Managing E-mail

Trainee teachers are expected to use electronics technology in and out of the classroom to foster the teaching learning process. Because the traditional lecturing method alone did not bring the desired effect and allow learners to be effective communicator as the 21st century community demands. 
In previous "basic computer" training you have learned and created your internet account. Now, using your account, you are going to practice to **input the address of a website, send and receive**

emails, and downloading files from the internet using the mobile phone.

Go to the app's menu on your mobile phone and use any browsers like Internet explorer, Chrome, Gmail and Google. For the purpose of this tutorial, we use Gmail to input your address on the address bar. Now, press the Gmail icon as indicated below.



- Now a new window will pop out to enter your address. In "email address" section, enter your address which looks like this: <u>melakuhailemichael7@gmail.com</u>; <u>melaku20@yahoo.com</u>. Next, enter your **password** in the space provided below. And press the "log in" button to go to "in box". The inbox the place where you will see email messages sent to you.
- Now practice the following steps as shown below. Note that while you read the message, you may encounter an

attachment icon Attachments. This indicates that you have attachment file that you need to download. So, if you see thing, you should press/click it and "View & Save" options will be displayed. So, select the SAVE button as a result the process of downloading will emerge.

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Make free phone calls and send free texts [using cross platform apps] In this tutorial we practice using VIBER app. Note that in order to use this application, your friends' must install the VIBER application. It should also be noted that the communication through Viber requires internet connection. So, you should turn ON the packet/cellular data or Wi-Fi to get the service (how to turn the ON & OFF the packet/cellular data or Wi-Fi has shown in the above activities.)

> Go to the application menu and select/press the "Viber" application icon as shown below. As you do so it will lead you to the new window.




- In the main Viber window, you will see features like CHATE, CONTACTS, & CALLS. Press CONTACT if you were already contacted with your friends using Viber application previously. If this is so select your friend's phone number and press a "Free Call" button to start calling.
- If your friends' contact number is not displayed in the dropdown list, press CALL button and enter the phone number you wish to call. Here two options (Viber Out Call and Invite to Viber) are displayed. If your friend is not the user of Viber app, press "Invite to Viber" button. As a result, a notification message will reach to your friend. Otherwise press the "Viber Out Call" button to call him/her.

Take and share a photograph

Sometimes, you may need to take a photograph and share it to your nearby friends to discus and comment on it. This can easily be done using technological tools in your mobile phone. So in this tutorial, you are going to practice how to use a **camera** in your mobile and share it to your colleague through the use of **Bluetooth** infrared technology. To do that you should follow the following step-by-step procedure.

Go to the application menu on your mobile and press the "camera" icon to take photo. Next the clear scree with camera icon will appear as shown in the figure bellow. And hold the camera straight to the direction of the objects that you want to take and:



Remember that the data transferring process will be carried out only when the Bluetooth device is in the ON position and paired with your friend's mobile. Also, the data transferring process depends on the size of the file. Usually transferring video file will take some time because its size and capacity is big and thus your friend's data space on the phone to hold the file should be enough.

In this tutorial you are going to practice the Storing and sharing files in Google apps. It can be done quickly and easily if you know the location of your files.

Now, follow the following steps to *store* the files in Google drive and share the files to anyone you like.

- → Now, using your mobile phone, go to the "My File/ file manager" folder and open it. From the dropdown lists, select "documents". Here you may see some files that are stored in your phone.
- At the top-right side of the screen, there is a "More" button. Press/select the "More" to get list of instructions and,
- → Select "share". When you do so, rectangular shapes will appear in front of each file (ready to be selected and waiting for you to select them).
- → Select one or more of this rectangular shape

Storing and sharing files

Note that when you select the file, a mark $\sqrt{}$ will appear inside the rectangle.

- → When you do so, the "share" menu will appear in the topright side of the screen. So press it to go to the next step.
- → Now lists of applications will emerge. From the lists, select the "save to drive" icon. And then select "save" button.

Now you have stored your files in the Google apps. The advantage of storing your files and photos in Google apps is that you can access and use them anywhere and anytime (even if you lost your mobile) as long as you remember your Google account and password.

Similarly, using mobile phone, you can also *share* files to yours over the internet. The following practices will help you to share files to anyone you like. So, let's tryout the activities.

- → Now, using your mobile phone, go to the "My File/ file manager" folder and open it. From the dropdown lists, select "documents". Here you may see some files that are stored in your phone.
- At the top-right side of the screen, there is a "More" button. Press/select the "More" to get list of instructions and,
- → Select "share". When you do so, rectangular shapes will appear in front of each file (ready to be selected and waiting for you to select them).

Mobile phones with high capabilities extend into all areas of human life, so wireless communication technology is growing rapidly. Consequently, mobile learning can be considered as the next generation of e-learning. So, mobile devices are not substitute for existing learning devices, but they serve as extension for learning in a new environment having new capabilities, though, not all learning content and activities are appropriate for mobile devices.

Before discussing and presenting possible examples as well as specific activities that are designed for and used on mobile phones, I would like to ponder on some questions related to the issue of mlearning. These questions may help teachers to find out what difference m-learning might make to their teaching. The issue of mlearning may induce curiosity, or excitement.

- Is it really possible to learn/learn a foreign language with such small devices?
 - 2. What sort of people use mobile devices for teaching and
 - learning/learning a foreign language?
 - 3. What sort of subjects and situations are appropriate for mobile learning?
 - 4. Are our students already using handheld computers for
 - learning?


to complete a lesson. You can use these language learning apps to learn words and phrases in lots of different languages, including Spanish, English, French, Italian, German, Irish, Dutch, Russian, Chinese, and many others. Just check each description to see which app teaches what language.

Hello English covers all the aspects of language learning, including vocabulary, translation, grammar, spellings, spoken, and reading skills. However, you should **already be able to understand basic English structure** and alphabets, the app can't help you learn English from scratch.

When you'll first launch the app, you'll have to **select your native language to continue**. There are **22 languages supported**, and make sure you choose the right one as the app will work in your native language from here.



Afterwards, you'll be given a 20 questions test that the app will use to assess your current English level. According to the test results, you'll be recommended lessons that will work best for you. For example, when I did a perfect score on the test, the app recommended me to start from the lesson 351. Although, when I did very poor on the test, the app recommended me to start from the lesson 1.

Mobile devices for Different Activities

Apart from the downloadable apps from the play store and website, the mobile phone by itself can be used for English language teaching. Examples of mobile learning and mobile learning situations can be the following:

- SMS-based learning receiving wanted text messages supports learning outside classroom.
- GAME-based learning in which learning materials are so designed to be integrated with aspects of physical environment, they serve as a link between the real world of knowledge and the visual world of the game, e.g. **Timelab** is a game about climate change and its effects. Players get information about possible new environmental changes and laws as they progress in the game. The results of the game can be later discussed in the classroom.
- M-learning can be used to teach such skills as: vocabulary, pronunciation, grammar, listening, reading comprehension, speaking and spelling. Variety of activities related to language learning can be supported by mobile devices:
 - SMS vocabulary, reading, writing;
 - Internet access reading comprehension, listening, speaking;
 - camera speaking when e.g. describing a picture or a scene;
 - audio/video recording listening, speaking, understanding and listening to other speakers;
 - Video messaging MMS sending recorded scenes, role-play situations, recorded speaking tasks.

Now let's practice using the 'ideal self' language user; reflecting on learning and motivation

This activity might help with:

- learners getting to know themselves and each other and building confidence in their second language identities
- developing speaking and writing skills
- focusing on language modal verbs
- identifying useful and not so helpful language learning strategies and providing help with identifying new ideas to try
- Introducing learners to digital literacies involved in creating multimedia recordings and sharing these in an online space; negotiating rules for etiquette, privacy and safe online practices.
- 1. Introduce learners to the ideal second language self as a concept, relating to the various characteristics that learners would ideally like to possess as a fluid and fluent 'ideal self' language user. Learners might like to discuss their own sense of identity as a language learner.

Learners could write/record one sentence in their current or ought-to self, go on to their ideal L2 self, and comment on/discuss their own and each other's representations. 5. Reflection should involve considering how far they have come, and how far to go in their own 'language learning journeys' as well as identifying appropriate learning goals and strategies for achieving these. Learners should be asked to document the process and achievement of one or two of their goals (and challenges) by using the audio voice or video recording functions of their mobile phones or by taking a photograph. 

Therefore, teachers can make good use of the platform to reach out famous authors and subject related experts to talk to the students, share valuable insights and knowledge through videoconferencing feature of Skype. Use Twitter as a class message board - Twitter can be great as a discussion board or message board for a class. Teachers can create a single Twitter handle per class and reuse it every year, or they can create a new handle each school year. A screen capture is a snapshot or recording of anything on your current computer screen—your desktop, a window, an application, a region, a hidden window, or an entire webpage and turning into an image or video. Screen captures allow you to communicate quickly and efficiently with others. Screen captures are one of the most useful ways of sharing what we see.


While they may seem similar, a screenshot and screen capture are a little different. A screenshot only refers to a static image. A desktop screen capture involves grabbing anything on your screen, including images, animated GIFs, or videos. 





Moodle is a large, Web-based software package that enables instructors, trainers, and educators to create Internet-based courses. Moodle is an acronym for Modular Object-Oriented Dynamic Learning Environment. Moodle provides a robust system and an organized, easy-to-use interface for learning over the Internet. One of the greatest advantages in sticking with Moodle is that developers have kept the look and feel consistent over the years, and they promise to continue to keep it consistent so that each upgrade doesn't feel like it's a piece of new software.

Moodle enables educators and trainers to create online courses. Moodle's home page (Moodle also calls it the course front page) displays, in its basic form a link to a list of participants (including the teacher and students), a calendar with a course schedule and list of assignments, resources, activities, updates, and news. This book explains all of Moodle features, including online quizzes, forums, glossaries of terms, wikis, access to documents, and links to other Web resources, and more.

Moodle is referred to as a course management system (CMS), learning management system (LMS), virtual learning environment (VLE), or more recently a learning content management system (LCMS).

So why would your organization use Moodle, or why should you learn to use Moodle? I can give you a number of reasons. Moodle is

- ✓ Widely used, domestically and globally: As of January 2011, more than 39 million registered users are using Moodle. This list shows you a few other stats (the numbers are from http://moodle.org/stats):
 - Registered courses: 4,303,011
 - Users: 40, 590, 582,899,203
 - Teachers: 1,190,743
 - Enrollments: 18,794,573
 - Largest site: 59,920 courses with 225,546 users
 - *Site with most registered users:* Open University 714,310 (Moodle. org has 1,030,779)
 - Countries using Moodle: 213
 - Languages: 83
- ✓ The largest community of users around the globe for a distance learning software: Moodle has an incredibly large and active community spanning the globe. It has been vital to the success of Moodle, and I can guarantee that if you post a question to the help forums, someone will be awake, somewhere around the globe, and you will have a reply. It's like a 24/7 tech support group. See http://moodle.org/forums.
- ✓ Based on a sound educational philosophy: Moodle is based on sound pedagogical principals and educational philosophy, making it one of the few LCMS that's learning-centered instead of tool- and gadget-centered.
- ✓ Free: There's no initial cost to purchase the software and no license fees! Moodle is open source software, meaning it's free and governed by GNU Public License (www.gnu.org/copyleft/gpl.html). You may think that nothing is free. Moodle *is* in that you don't have to pay for the software or the upgrades or license, installation, and training (what the marketing and sales team try to get you to commit to when you purchase large software packages).

Understanding Moodle Basics If you want to explore Moodle and perhaps are excited to start developing your first Moodle course, you need to know a few details about Moodle to navigate it and speak the language. The following sections help get you started.

Creating a Moodle account and logging in to your course You need just a couple things to get started with Moodle:

An account with a username and password: Aren't you glad to learn that Moodle is secure? You need a Teacher, a Course Creator, or an Administrator account in order to have editing privileges and create courses.

You can contact your system administrator to set up an account for you.

A URL: The URL depends on your organization or a thirdparty company that will host your Moodle site.

If you have an account and a URL, open your Web browser (Moodle works best with Internet Explorer and Firefox) and go to the URL. If this is your first time accessing your Moodle site, you come to a page similar to Figure 1-1.

Next time you return to the course, either you see just the login box as shown in Figure 1-2 (or Figure 1-1) or you go straight to a list of courses on your Moodle site with a login link in the top-right corner. You have a number of options to log in, all quite straightforward and simple.

Navigating the Moodle interface

Finding your way around the Moodle course front page is not difficult when you understand some of the basic terminology and where things are located. Before I begin to help you familiarize yourself with the Moodle interface, you need to understand some terms that I continue to use throughout the book, and the explanation in this chapter will make more sense. These terms are specific to Moodle, so it's a good idea to use them as your reference starting point.





Figure 1-3: The Moodle site front page.

✓ Moodle site/Moodle site front page: Refers to the Moodle software platform that contains all of your organization's courses and blocks with utilities for managing the site. Figure 1-3 shows an example of a Moodle site front page, which includes all the courses available on the site. There is a login link in the top-right corner, a site calendar, site news, and the Site Administration block. When a reference is made to a *site*, it's available to all courses and all users in the site. Organizations usually run only one Moodle site.

A Teacher or Student account would not be able to see the Site Administration block located on the left in Figure 1-3

- ✓ Moodle course: A Moodle course is much like a real-world course, but online: It's a collection of lessons, assignments, quizzes, documents, projects, grade book, and class discussions. An instructor constructs a syllabus, which is posted on the course front page, and students can download instructions, upload completed assignments, and collaborate through wikis, chats, and online forums.
- ✓ Course front page: Refers to the course home page it's your work space and where your learners come when they log in to your Moodle course. On your course front page, you have more tools available to you than your learners do. These additional tools enable you to build and edit your course.

A number of settings offer the instructor controls and tools to add content (called *resources*) and modules such as Wikis, Forums, and Quizzes (called *activities*). The course front page is broken into course sections by week or topic (there are other settings that enable you to set up the course to meet your teaching requirements), and you can add resources and activities to each section.




Figure 1-5: The editing tools are available.

Figure 1-4 shows what a teacher view of the course front page looks like without the editing features enabled. Figure 1-5 demonstrates the same page with the editing features enabled and number of activities and resources listed under the different sections (topics or units).

The course front page includes *blocks* on the left and right sides with the center column reserved for the course content. Blocks are tools — kind of like containers for you and your learners. For example, you have blocks for a calendar, search box, lists of activities and resources, participants, newsfeeds, and so on. Many blocks can have links to various activities. By default, each course front page has specific blocks, such as Participants, Latest News, Upcoming Events, and Recent Activity.

When you first access your course, familiarize yourself with the course front page. Find the Turn Editing On button, located in the top-right corner, and click it. You see your course front page come to life, displaying colorful editing icons, including the Activity and Resource drop-down lists appearing in each section. A new Block drop-down list also shows up on the right side. Explore and familiarize yourself with what you have available.

Moodle uses a number of terms and specific conventions particular to the software. In the following list, I mention and explain some of these terms and conventions to help you ease into the book:

- ✓ User: A specific participant who is allowed to enter a Moodle site. Each user account has a specific role, which carries a set of permissions.
- ✓ Roles: Roles are user accounts identifying the participants in the site and course. Each role has a set of permissions with capabilities to interact with Moodle. When Moodle is installed, it automatically creates a set of default roles — Administrator, Teacher, Non-Editing Teacher, Course Creator, Student, and Guest
- ✓ Capability: Capabilities are Moodle features. Each activity has specific capabilities and certain roles have the

Understanding Moodle terms and conventions

- ✓ capabilities assigned to interact in different capacities with the activities. For example, a Teacher role can post discussions to the News forum, but a Student role can only read a news forum and not post to or reply to it.
- ✓ Permission: Permissions are specific settings for capabilities. You have four options: Not Set/Inherit, Allow, Prevent, or Prohibit.
- ✓ Activities: You can add separate, interactive learning activity modules to your course. They are robust, and each one can be set up to work with individual students, groups, or everyone in the course. The Add an Activity functionality is enabled when you click the Turn Editing On button. (See Figure 1-5.) The drop-down list appears in each section/week of your course. Many of the activities can be graded and push information to a course grade book.




Figure 1-6: The Add an Activity drop-down list

- ✓ Resources: Moodle resources are types of tools that enable you to include almost any kind of file, including multimedia files and links to resources on the Internet. Resources include simple text pages, Web pages including a WYSIWYG editor, IMS packages, and more. Like activities, you add resources by using a drop-down list when editing is turned on. Figure 1-7 shows the drop-down list of various resources.
- ✓ Blocks: Blocks are container-like tools that provide specific information or functionality. There are more than 16 types of blocks, many of which are flexible so that you can use them for a variety of functions. For instance, the HTML block can display a short video on the course front page. The Blocks block appears bottom of the right column when you turn on editing.




Figure 1-8: The Blocks drop-down list

In Moodle apps window, students can upload their assignment to submit their work online using the **Moodle course page** as shown in **Figure 1-3.** A Moodle course page is a collection of lessons, assignments, quizzes, documents, projects, grade book, and class discussions. An instructor constructs a syllabus, which is posted on the course front page, and students can download instructions, upload completed assignments, and collaborate through wikis, chats, and online forums. So to upload the assignment file, follow the steps:

- Open e-learning website
- Click on the 'added assignment'
- Click on "Add submission"
- Select the file to be uploaded from the box at the upper left side
- Click on "Upload file"

Welcome to the quizzes and question banks tutorial! In this tutorial, you will learn how to create:

- Question banks
- Several types of multiple-choice questions
- Cloze questions

The Moodle quiz engine has been recognized as one of the most powerful and easy-to-use open-source computer apps in the world! Instructors can create quizzes that can be set to percentage grades, set as pass/fail, left ungraded, or taken multiple times. Because of this versatility, online quizzes can be used for formative and summative assessment, practice tests for students, and other types of interactive activities.

Moodle allows for many questions' types, including:

- **Multiple-choice**—Can be set to one correct answer or several correct answers.
- All-or-nothing multiple choice—A multiple-choice (multiple correct) question type that requires students choose all of the correct responses in question. This question type is different than a standard multiple-choice question with several answers.
- **True/false**—Functions like multiple-choice question, but with only two possible choices.
- **Essay**—Students compose long answers to questions. Essay questions must be graded manually by the instructor.
- **Matching**—Students match the question to a set of responses either in a dropdown menu or by dragging and dropping the answer.
- **Short answer**—Students type in a word. The "short answer" can only be one word or a very short phrase that a student would most likely word correctly.

Note: Even with an answer such as "Stop, drop, and roll," you must code all the possible correct answers, such as "stop drop roll," "stop, drop, roll" "stop, drop, and roll," "stop drop and roll," "stop, drop, & roll," "stop drop & roll" and any other possible combination that would be considered correct. For this reason, requiring students to type a sentence rarely works well for an auto-graded short answer question.

- Cloze—Similar to the short answer question type, but cloze questions consist of a sentence or paragraph where certain words are removed and students must provide the missing words.
 - **Numerical**—Similar to a short answer question, except this question format requires students to type in a number for the response.
- **Calculated**—Similar to numerical, but the possible answer choices are drawn from a pool.

To use these files, save the zipped folder to your hard drive. Navigate to the location where you saved the zipped folder. Rightmouse-click on the zipped folder and then click to extract the files. This process unzips the Moodle Quiz Tutorial folder so that you can access the individual image files.

In addition, please remember to do the following:

- Watch the video recommended for each question type before attempting the activity for the first time. The written instructions will make much more sense if you watch the video first! □
- Questions created in a question bank do not appear in a quiz until they've been moved into the quiz.
- If a question you have created does not appear in the question bank, you may have accidentally created it in the default area for the quiz or for the course. Check the default areas, locate the question, and then move it to the proper question bank.
- Although you can delete questions from a quiz, be careful about deleting questions from a question bank. If you do not like a particular question, simply remove the question from the quiz or edit the question.
- It is possible to import entire quizzes at one time into a Moodle course by using tests that have been formatted in MS-Word. This method requires users to format quizzes in

Avoid using spaces in the file name, such as "barn drawing.jpg." Accurate and concise image descriptions are very important for web-based images, and they are required by law for accessibility reasons. Be sure to give proper credit to the image author if the photo was located online or is one that you do not own. Do not use copyrighted images without written permission.

8 Hit the Enter key after the image to move the cursor to the line underneath the image. Type the question in the **Question text** editing box underneath the image.

Under **Default points**, assign a point value. 9

- 10 Under One or multiple answers, select One answer only from the dropdown menu.
- 11 Choose whether to shuffle the choices within the question. The Shuffle the choices box should have a checkmark by it.
- 12 pe in a response for each Choice box, allowing for only one correct answer. Since the question has only one answer, select 100% in the Grade dropdown menu for the correct answer. Leave the grade value at None for incorrect choices.
- 13 Under the section **Multiple tries**, if setting up a practice quiz, set the **Penalty for each incorrect try** to 0%.
- 14 Click the Save changes button at the bottom of the screen when finished.

For training purposes, type in the question:

Which of the following animals would most likely be found in a barnyard?

In this case, select 1 as the default points.

Select the multiple answers option if students are to select more than one answer that applies.

By default, the answer choices will shuffle. However, for "all of the above," "none of the above," or "a and b only" type of questions, uncheck this box to ensure answer choices remain in a logical order.

For training purposes, under Choice 1, type "rooster" (without quote marks), with the grade of 100% selected from the dropdown menu. For Choice 2, type "lion." For Choice 3, type "monkey." For Choice 4, type "zebra." Incorrect answers should have the Grade set to None.

Under the section **Multiple tries**, if setting up a practice quiz, set the Penalty for each incorrect **try** to 0%.

This sends you back to the **Editing quiz** page for your quiz.

In the Grade boundary 100% Feedback box, you may type in the message the student will see when they get all of the answers correct. If students earn below a certain percentage, you may type in the critical percentage and the message students will see. Multiple percentage levels can be set.

You can also choose to make the quiz available but not shown on the course page to make the course site appear less cluttered. If using this option, you must provide a link to the quiz from somewhere else such as a Moodle page, but the quiz still appears in the gradebook.

Setting an ID number provides a way of identifying the activity for grading purposes. If the activity is not included in any grade calculation, you may leave the ID number field blank.

For training purposes, use the No groups setting.

The ability to use groups is set in the course settings. Group settings allow an instructor to assign students to small groups, which works well for large classes. In addition, Groups may be used by an instructor who teaches more than one section of the same course during the same semester.

This field only becomes active if you have enabled the Group Mode setting and students have been assigned to groups.

This set of fields ensures students can only access the quiz after completing certain activities.

Remember, if you want to require students to select all of the correct responses in a multiplecorrect question, choose the All-or-Nothing question type.

Note: The All-or-nothing question type is a Moodle plugin, and you may need to request that your server administer install it.

A cloze question can be fill-in-the-blank, multiple-choice with a list of possible answers, numerical, or a combination of multiple cloze question types all in one question. Although effective, cloze questions are used less frequently because the answer choices require special coding. Don't let this prevent you from using this type of question—cloze questions are easy to code!

Google Classroom for e-learning

Moodle requires a server for hosting our lessons but google classroom solves this problem through cloud hosting.



Introduction	Google Classroom integrates Google Docs, Drive, and Gmail in order to create and collect assignments in a paperless environment. By utilizing Classroom, you can create assignments for one or multiple classes, and assign the assignment to each student or a group of students. As a teacher, you can view who has or has not completed assignments, provide feedback during and after assignments, and assign grades. Visit Blogger. Go to blogger.com from any web browser. Here you will see a sign-in box. Blogger is Google's blog platform. 2

**Log into your Google account.** Under the sign-in box, type in your Gmail email address and password. This is your one Google ID for all Google's services, including Blogger. Click the "Sign in" button to proceed.

• Once you're signed in, you will be brought to your main Blogger dashboard. All your blogs are found here. Blogs you follow can also be accessed from the dashboard.

**Click "New blog.**" You'll find this under your Blogs section on the dashboard. After you click the button, the "Create a new blog" window will appear. It contains several fields you need to populate to define your blog.

## 4

**Enter a blog Title.** The first field is for your blog title. Think of something creative and memorable for your title to attract readers. There's a lot of blogs out there and you need to find your niche. Picking the perfect title can be hard, but it's important. It's your name, your brand, and your trademark. 5

# **Create your Address.** Since you're housing your blog on Blogger, you will have "blogspot.com" in your address. The name that goes before it is something you can control. You can use your title or part of it as your address. Similar to your blog title, your URL or Internet address needs to be unique and attractive. Make it memorable so that people can easily recognize and remember it. Type it in the second field. If the text you've entered is already taken, you will be notified since the address needs to be unique. **6**

**Pick a Template.** The third section contains templates for your blog. Blogger has some good templates available to help you start your blog. Scroll through the available templates and pick one that suits your blog. Remember, you can always fine-tune your theme later.

# 7

**Create your blog.** When you're done, click the "Create blog!" button at the bottom of the window. You're set. The blog is now created and you can start writing.
